



# Sherborne C of E Primary School – PE and Sport Premium Funding Report September 2018

The Sports Premium is additional funding given to every primary school in England. It must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, and to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles. The aim of the funding is for all pupils leaving primary school to be physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

At Sherborne C of E Primary School, we spend our PE and Sport Premium in the following areas:

1. Improving the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. Raising the profile of PE and sport across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increasing the confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broadening experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increasing participation in competitive sport

Over 2017-2018 financial year, the School spent a total of £2,760.04 on developing its sporting provision and participation. The remainder of the budget, £10,181.96, will be used to part-fund

the building of a sports hall for the School. It is anticipated that this project will be completed by September 2020.
